# **Educational Resource Center Needs Your Help!**

The Owens House (c. 1857), the oldest extant structure in North Creek is part of the Depot Museum complex. Located less than 50 yards from the museum, the classroom is ideally located to serve as our educational resource center. The sizable first-floor gallery adds significantly to our museum exhibition space and enables us to install a variety of exhibitions. The main entrance on Main Street provides direct access to the gallery. This space offers a multitude of potential uses where we can host lectures, historical presentations, book talks, and other programmatic offerings



Unfortunately, the Owens House is currently unusable due to a pervasive high humidity condition in the house stemming from a heavy moisture and mold problem in the basement. These poor environmental conditions make it extremely unsafe for human use and detrimental to our rare

and unique collections. Before we can realize the full potential of this extraordinary facility, a major moisture remediation and mold abatement project must first be completed. This expensive work is well beyond our annual operating budget. So, the museum trustees have embarked on a major capital fund raising initiative, seeking both state and federal support as well as foundation funding and individual donors to accomplish this essential work. Going forward, we will be updating our members on these fund-raising efforts to restore this wonderful and vitally important museum space. We hope you will generously support this effort.

# "People and Trains That Could."

Thanks to the efforts of NCRDPA Trustee Linda Quintavalle, the North Creek Railway Depot Museum has again been awarded a LARAC Education Grant for its program entitled "People and Trains That Could." These funds enable us to continue and expand upon our class offerings in collaboration with Johnsburg Central School. Diverse topics include "Teddy Roosevelt's Night Ride to the Presidency," the development of the Snow Trains of the 1930s and its impact on skiing in this region, the 10<sup>th</sup> Mountain Division in World War II, and the significance of trains in the economic growth of the region. Age-appropriate activities range from Pre-Kindergarten to Grade 6 and incorporate museum visits to build upon the lessons and skills presented at the school. Adult and student actors portray historical figures such as young Teddy Roosevelt, his teenage daughter Alice, Edith Roosevelt, also Lois Perret Schaefer, Art Draper, and others. Performances took place on the Depot platform in September for Johnsburg's History Days. A special visit was made to the school this September, as Joe Wiegand, renowned Teddy Roosevelt impersonator, addressed 4th, 5<sup>th</sup>, and 6<sup>th</sup> grade classes at JCS. These funds will also allow for winter related topics in the classrooms through December.

# 90<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the First "Snow Train"

On March 4, 1934, the First Snow Train arrived in North Creek from Schenectady, carrying 378 intrepid winter sports enthusiasts. The Snow Trains brought thousands of visitors to North Creek, where they enjoyed skiing the trails in our "Ride Up-Slide Down" town. Many skiers stayed in homes and boosted the local economy during the long Depression years.

This winter, we will be celebrating the 90th Anniversary of the first train with music, films, and lectures. Look for the anniversary logo at local retailers, and enjoy meals/deals at restaurants and retailers for only \$19.34! The events kick off with a Coffee House at Tannery Pond Center (TPC) on January 14 with Jim Gaudet and the Railroad Boys. A complete schedule will be posted on the Depot Museum and TPC websites.

## **Cunningham Exhibit and Reception**

This year the Board of Directors, led by Trustee Cindy Morse, prepared a new exhibit spotlighting a family who has contributed immensely to our local ski history. We chose the Cunningham Family, focusing on Butler Cunningham as one of the pioneers who brought skiing to North Creek beginning at the North Creek Ski Bowl in the 1930s. We also acknowledged his son, Patrick J Cunningham, detailing his early days competing on the international race circuit, as well as pioneering white-water rafting on the Hudson River.

On August 27, 2023, the Museum held a Reception honoring the family. Deb, Tom, and Dick Cunningham, as well as Mary Cunningham Moro shared wonderful memories of early skiing in North Creek at this wonderful event. Please take some time to stop in to view our exhibit along with all the other wonderful displays in the Depot Museum.


#### **Grant Supports Book Reprint**

These authentic conductor's pocket watches were donated to the Museum this summer by a good friend of Linda Quintavalle's, John Lange of Red Bank, NJ.

One was made by the Hamiliton Watch Company and has 27 jewels and has a watch makers scratch mark under the cover dating back to the 1800s.
